## Medical authorisation for travel

This person's allergy action plan and emergency medications should be easily accessible at all times while travelling. Emergency medications may include:

- One or more Jext<sup>®</sup> adrenaline autoinjector devices
- > Antihistamines (as tablet or syrup)
- Immunotherapy medications
- > Asthma medications

This person and/or their family must be allowed to carry a safe and appropriate supply of food and liquid with them for the travel period. For infants this may include, but is not limited to, milk formula.

# Immediate administration of an adrenaline autoinjector is the first line treatment for anaphylaxis.

This is a single, fixed dose of adrenaline which can be life-saving. In some cases one dose is not enough and another autoinjector may need to be administered 5-15minutes after the first injection.

The luggage hold of an aircraft is NOT an appropriate place for the storage of emergency medications, as these:

- > Need to be readily available
- > Can be broken with rough handling
- > May be lost if luggage goes astray
- > Must not be subjected to temperature fluctuations.

## Jext® autoinjectors must therefore be carried in the hand luggage or on the person.
